REQUEST FOR PROPOSALS

I. INTRODUCTION AND BACKGROUND

The City of Grass Valley ("City") is seeking proposals from qualified multidisciplinary consulting firms to provide professional planning, engineering, public engagement, and implementation readiness services for the Future Paths Grass Valley: Everyday Mobility Connecting People and Places Project, funded through the California Air Resources Board (CARB) Community Planning and Capacity Building Program.

Future Paths Grass Valley represents an opportunity to shape the future of mobility within the community by creating a connected network of walking, bicycling, and shared-use pathways that improve access to schools, neighborhoods, parks, employment centers, commercial districts, and community destinations. More than a transportation planning effort, this project is intended to strengthen community connections, promote healthy lifestyles, reduce greenhouse gas emissions, enhance transportation equity, and improve quality of life for residents of all ages and abilities.

The City is seeking a consultant team with demonstrated expertise in active transportation planning, multimodal transportation systems, community engagement, conceptual engineering, environmental planning, GIS analysis, Tribal collaboration, and implementation strategy development. The selected consultant will work closely with City staff, community organizations, educational partners, regional agencies, Tribal representatives, and residents to develop a community-supported vision that is technically sound, financially implementable, and positioned for future State and Federal funding opportunities.

The City's goal is to produce an implementation-ready planning document that identifies practical, community-driven transportation improvements capable of advancing Grass Valley's long-term mobility, sustainability, and economic development objectives

Located in the western Sierra Nevada foothills, the City of Grass Valley is one of the historic, economic, governmental, and commercial center of western Nevada County. With approximately 14,000 residents and a service area extending beyond its municipal boundaries, Grass Valley serves one of the regional destination for employment, healthcare, education, shopping, recreation, and government services.

While the City benefits from its rich history, compact downtown, and extensive network of neighborhoods and public facilities, its transportation system has developed primarily around automobile travel. Existing pedestrian and bicycle facilities are often disconnected, creating barriers to safe and convenient travel between neighborhoods, schools, parks, commercial areas, and community services.

Physical constraints such as steep topography, State Highway 49, Wolf Creek, and historic development patterns further limit connectivity and present challenges for expanding active transportation infrastructure. At the same time, the community has expressed increasing interest in improving opportunities for walking, bicycling, and other forms of low-carbon transportation that promote public health, reduce traffic congestion, and support local economic vitality.

Recognizing these challenges and opportunities, the California Air Resources Board awarded the City of Grass Valley a \$500,000 Community Planning and Capacity Building Grant to undertake the Future Paths Grass Valley project. The project emphasizes community-driven planning that integrates technical analysis with meaningful public participation to identify transportation investments that reflect local priorities while advancing California's climate, equity, and mobility goals.

The project builds upon previous transportation, parks, recreation, and community planning efforts while focusing specifically on identifying feasible, implementation-ready improvements that expand multimodal transportation opportunities throughout the City. Particular emphasis will be placed on improving connections to schools, parks, downtown, employment centers, residential neighborhoods, transit services, and regional trail opportunities.

The planning process will include extensive collaboration with community stakeholders through advisory committees, public workshops, school-based outreach, participatory mapping, walk and roll audits, and engagement with the Nevada City Rancheria Nisenan and other community partners. This collaborative approach is intended to ensure that future transportation investments reflect the lived experiences and priorities of the community while creating equitable access to safe and reliable transportation options.

The final product will provide the City with a comprehensive implementation roadmap that includes prioritized transportation corridors, planning-level design concepts, multimodal integration strategies, implementation phasing, conceptual cost estimates, funding strategies, and grant-ready recommendations. These deliverables will position the City to compete successfully for future State and Federal funding programs, including the Active Transportation Program (ATP), Safe Routes to School, and other infrastructure grant opportunities.

Ultimately, Future Paths Grass Valley is intended to establish a long-term vision for a safer, healthier, more connected, and more sustainable community—one where residents and visitors can comfortably choose to walk, bicycle, or use other active modes of transportation to reach the places that matter most.

II. Project Vision

Future Paths Grass Valley: Connecting People. Connecting Places. Connecting Community.

Grass Valley is a community defined by its history, natural beauty, and strong sense of place. As a regional hub of western Nevada County, the City serves as a center for commerce, education, healthcare, recreation, and civic life. Future Paths Grass Valley seeks to build upon these strengths by creating a connected transportation network that makes it safer, easier, and more enjoyable for residents and visitors to walk, bicycle, and explore the community.

This project envisions a future where people of all ages and abilities can comfortably travel between neighborhoods, schools, parks, downtown, employment centers, and community

destinations without relying solely on an automobile. By improving connectivity and expanding active transportation opportunities, Grass Valley will become a healthier, more resilient, and more sustainable community while preserving the unique historic character that defines the City.

Future Paths Grass Valley is more than a transportation planning effort. It is an investment in the community's future—one that strengthens neighborhoods, supports local businesses, enhances environmental stewardship, and creates lasting public spaces that encourage recreation, social interaction, and economic vitality.

The City is committed to a planning process that is collaborative, transparent, and community driven. Through meaningful engagement with residents, schools, businesses, community organizations, Tribal partners, and regional agencies, the project will develop practical, implementation-ready solutions that reflect the community's priorities and position the City for future infrastructure investments.

The vision for Future Paths Grass Valley is guided by six core principles.

GUIDING PRINCIPLES

CONNECT: Create a connected network of trails, sidewalks, bicycle facilities, and shared-use pathways that link neighborhoods with schools, parks, downtown, employment centers, public services, and regional destinations.

III. Project Values

The City expects the selected consultant to embrace the following values throughout the planning process:

- **Community First** – Decisions should reflect the needs and aspirations of Grass Valley residents.
- **Collaboration** – Build partnerships with local agencies, schools, community organizations, and Tribal representatives.
- **Innovation** – Explore creative, data-driven solutions while remaining practical and implementable.
- **Equity** – Ensure transportation investments benefit all residents, particularly historically underserved populations.
- **Transparency** – Maintain open communication and provide opportunities for meaningful public participation.
- **Implementation Focus** – Produce recommendations that are realistic, fundable, and ready to advance into future design and construction

IV. Project Objectives

The primary objective of the Future Paths Grass Valley project is to prepare an implementation-ready active transportation plan that reflects community priorities, advances California's climate and equity goals, and positions the City for future infrastructure funding.

Specifically, the selected consultant shall work collaboratively with the City and project partners to achieve the following objectives:

Objective 1 – Develop a Connected Active Transportation Network

Identify and prioritize a connected system of trails, sidewalks, bicycle facilities, and shared-use pathways that improve access between neighborhoods, schools, parks, downtown, employment centers, and regional destinations.

Objective 2 – Conduct Meaningful Community Engagement

Implement an inclusive public engagement program that ensures residents, businesses, schools, Tribal representatives, community organizations, and historically underserved populations have meaningful opportunities to shape the project.

Objective 3 – Prepare Implementation-Ready Concepts

Develop planning-level concepts, typical sections, cost estimates, and implementation strategies that position priority projects for future design and construction funding.

Objective 4 – Advance Equity and Accessibility

Identify transportation improvements that increase mobility for people of all ages, abilities, and incomes while reducing barriers to accessing essential community services.

Objective 5 – Support Climate and Sustainability Goals

Develop recommendations that encourage walking, bicycling, and other active transportation modes to reduce greenhouse gas emissions, improve air quality, and promote healthier travel choices.

Objective 6 – Strengthen Community Partnerships

Build lasting partnerships among local agencies, educational institutions, community organizations, Tribal governments, and regional stakeholders to support implementation beyond the grant period.

Objective 7 – Position the City for Future Funding

Produce grant-ready planning documents that enhance the City's competitiveness for programs such as the Active Transportation Program (ATP), Safe Routes to School, and other state and federal funding opportunities

V. SCOPE OF WORK

Task 1.0: Community-Guided Planning, Governance, and Engagement Implementation

Implement the Administrator-approved Outreach and Engagement Plan to ensure community-defined priorities and equity goals guide technical planning and project recommendations. Establish and support two advisory cohorts and carry out structured engagement activities that generate usable inputs for route alternatives, evaluation criteria, and community benefit priorities. **(This task will have an assigned Staff person designated to help assist in many of these areas).**

1.1 Establish advisory cohorts and decision process.

1.1.1 Advisory Cohort Charters: Prepare charters for the Pathways Advisory Cohort and the Community Stewardship Advisory Cohort that define purpose, membership approach, roles, meeting cadence, decision points, and expectations for how recommendations will be developed and documented.

1.1.2 Cohort Operating Materials: Prepare operating guidelines and core materials (agenda template, decision log format, accessibility checklist, participation supports process, and meeting packet template).

1.2 Conduct advisory cohort milestone meetings and produce recommendations.

1.2.1 Convene both cohorts at defined milestones to shape community priorities, define trade-offs, review alignment concepts, and confirm screening criteria.

1.2.2 Milestone Recommendations: Produce milestone recommendations summaries that document inputs received and the resulting priorities, criteria, and recommended refinements to route concepts and community benefits.

1.3 Implement targeted engagement methods and compile inputs for planning decisions.

1.3.1 School-Based Outreach Summary: Conduct school-based outreach and compile findings on barriers, desired connections, and opportunities for school-focused programming; identify candidate school access points and considerations for safe routes.

1.3.2 Community Listening Sessions Summary: Conduct small-group listening sessions and compile themes related to daily travel challenges, safety concerns, and desired connections.

1.3.3 Participatory Mapping Outputs: Conduct participatory mapping and compile mapped inputs (preferred connections, unsafe locations, missing links, key destinations) for use in alignment development and the Project Community Map.

1.3.4 Walk and Roll Audit Summary: Conduct walk/roll audits along candidate corridors and compile findings related to comfort, accessibility, and safety to inform concept design considerations.

1.3.5 Indigenous Engagement Summary: Conduct engagement sessions with the Nevada City Rancheria Nisenan and compile themes and planning implications, including opportunities for land stewardship considerations, place-based learning, and interpretive elements.

1.4 Provide participation supports and accessibility measures.

1.4.1 Implement participation supports consistent with the approved plan (e.g., interpretation/translation as needed, ADA-accessible venues and formats, stipends/incentives where appropriate, and scheduling aligned with school and work hours).

1.4.2 Participation Supports Log: Maintain a record of supports offered and barriers addressed to document equitable engagement implementation.

1.5 Provide public-facing feedback loops and engagement documentation.

1.5.1 Provide periodic public updates and produce “What We Heard / How It Informed Decisions” summaries at key milestones.

1.5.2 Engagement Documentation Package: Compile engagement documentation suitable for submission and reporting, including outreach materials, summaries, attendance/participation metrics as appropriate, and the feedback loop summaries.

Task 2.0: Technical Planning: Off-Street Greenway Concepts, Multimodal Integration, and Implementation Readiness

Conduct planning-level technical work to identify feasible off-street greenway/shared-use path concepts that connect key destinations, integrate with transit and shared transportation, and support future GHG reductions by enabling alternatives to short vehicle trips. Technical work will be informed by the engagement outputs and advisory cohort guidance.

2.1 Compile baseline conditions and constraints relevant to off-street alignments.

2.1.1 Baseline Conditions Memo: Compile baseline conditions relevant to off-street alignments, including open space corridors, slope/grade considerations, key barriers, crossing needs, connectivity gaps, and

destination nodes (schools, housing, commercial areas, transit stops).

2.2 Develop conceptual alignment alternatives and screen using community-defined criteria and feasibility.

2.2.1 Identify a bounded set of conceptual off-street alignment alternatives and refine them iteratively based on advisory cohort input and engagement findings.

2.2.2 Conceptual Alignments Map Set: Produce a map set of conceptual alignments (and, if applicable, segments) with key assumptions and constraints.

2.2.3 Screening Criteria + Screening Summary: Document the community-informed route evaluation criteria and produce a screening summary showing how criteria and feasibility considerations were applied to narrow and prioritize alignments.

2.3 Develop planning-level concept design considerations.

2.3.1 Typical Sections and Design Considerations: Produce planning-level typical sections and design considerations that address width, grades, ADA accessibility, crossings, wayfinding, lighting where appropriate, and safety treatments suitable for shared-use greenways.

2.3.2 Crossings and Connection Concepts: Identify key street crossing locations and develop planning-level concepts for safe crossings and transitions that support all ages and abilities.

2.4 Evaluate multimodal integration and access strategies.

2.4.1 Assess connections to existing and planned bus routes/stops and identify opportunities for integration with shared transportation services and first/last mile access.

2.4.2 Multimodal Integration Memo: Produce a memo summarizing integration opportunities and access strategies that prioritize schools, housing, and daily destinations.

2.5 Prepare an implementation readiness package and capacity-building program frameworks.

2.5.1 Implementation Readiness Package: Produce a readiness package summarizing feasibility findings, early environmental considerations at a planning level (constraints, likely studies needed, risk flags), recommended next steps, potential phasing, and an implementation funding pathway for priority segments.

2.5.2 Planning-Level GHG/VMT Reduction Approach: Document a planning-

level approach for estimating how proposed connections could reduce short vehicle trips and support future GHG reductions (method description and data needs, not a full travel demand model unless required).

2.5.3 School Bicycle Education and Encouragement Framework: Develop a planning level framework and pilot concept for school-focused bicycle education and encouragement, including target audiences, candidate routes/activities, partner roles, and considerations for scaling beyond the grant term.

2.5.4 Indigenous Education and Interpretation Concepts: Identify planning-level concepts for place-based learning and interpretive opportunities along proposed greenways, developed in collaboration with Tribal partners and aligned with engagement findings

VI. PROPOSAL FORMAT

The proposal should be limited to specific discussions of the elements outlined in this RFP. The intent of the RFP is to encourage responses that meet the stated requirements, and propose the best methods to accomplish the work within the stated budget. The proposal should follow the general outline in the order shown below:

Cover Page/Introduction: A brief description of the contractor's firm, including the year the firm was established, type of organization of firm (partnership, corporation, etc.), and a statement of the firm's qualification for performing the subject services. Cover page/introduction shall be limited to one single sided page.

Key Personnel: A summary of the qualifications and experience of each key person proposed to work on this project. Any key sub-contractors proposed should be identified along with their respective role in the project. Key Personnel summary shall be limited to an equivalent of two single sided pages.

Description of Work: A discussion of the firm's qualifications and ability to provide the requested services to complete the proposed project. Describe any equipment to be installed and experience that would contribute to successful execution of the work, especially projects/contracts of similar nature. Description of work shall be limited to an equivalent of three single sided pages.

Cost Proposal: Provide an hourly rate schedule for key personnel/positions and equipment to be used on this project, including all overhead charges, and a summary of any other related costs that are to be billed directly. (Should be provided in a separate sealed envelope)

References: A list of references for similar projects, including contact person, phone numbers, and the professional staff who performed the work.

Exceptions and Additions: Describe any proposed exceptions, alterations or additions to the Scope of Services or other requirements of this RFP, including the standards Professional Service Agreement.

VII. PROPOSAL SUBMITTAL

Proposals are to be received at the City of Grass Valley City Hall office no later than **September 15, 2026 at 5:00 p.m.** The transmittal letter should include the name, title, address, phone number, an original signature of an individual with authority to negotiate on behalf of and to contractually bind the contractor, and who may be contacted during the period of proposal evaluation. The letter must also include a statement acknowledging that the contractor has reviewed and accepted the City of Grass Valley sample agreement (Attachment A) with or without qualifications. Only one transmittal letter need to be prepared to accompany all copies of the technical and cost proposals.

VIII. SELECTION CRITERIA

A Selection Committee will perform an in-depth analysis of all proposals, carefully evaluating each one with the following criteria:

Submittals will be reviewed for responsiveness, and responsive submittals will further be screened by a selection committee in accordance with the above criteria. The firm(s) submitting the highest rated proposal may be invited for interviews (optional).

The City reserves the right to make an award without further discussion of the submittal with the offeror. Therefore, the proposal should be submitted initially on the most favorable terms that the firm or individual might propose.

The City reserves the right to award a contract to the firm(s) that presents the best qualifications and whose proposal best accomplishes the desired results.

The City reserves the right to reject any or all proposals, or to waive minor irregularities in said proposals, or to negotiate with the successful firm(s). In the case of differences between written words and figures in a proposal, the amount stated in written words shall govern. In the case of a difference in unit price versus the extended figure, the unit price shall govern.

Award of a contract will not be based on discrimination based on race, religion, color, age, sex or national origin in accordance with the requirements of Title 49 CFR 26.13(b).

IX. BUDGET AND FINANCIAL CONDITIONS

The contract that results from this RFP will specify a maximum “not to exceed” fee. A budget amount and payment schedule will be agreed upon between the City and the contractor during contract negotiations.

All applicable costs may be charged to the contract within the agreed upon fixed price limit. Appropriate charges may include wages and salaries, overhead, travel, materials and subcontractor costs. Contractor shall provide all necessary equipment including software, materials, supplies, and safety equipment required for its personnel to perform the services accurately, efficiently, and safely. Compensation for these items shall be considered included in the various items of work listed on the Contractor’s cost proposal. Only those items listed in the cost proposal shall be reimbursed by the City.

The City will not provide financial assistance to the contractor beyond negotiated fees but will collaborate with the contractor and give reasonable cooperation in the collection of information and facilitation of meetings with appropriate agencies. The City of Grass Valley shall not be liable for any pre-contractual expenses incurred by the Contractor in the preparation of its proposal. Pre-contractual expenses are defined as expenses incurred by the Contractor in preparing its proposal; submitting the proposal; negotiating with the City of Grass Valley related to this RFP; or any other expenses that may be incurred by the Contractor prior to the date of award of this Contract.

X. GENERAL TERMS & CONDITIONS

Standard Contract. Upon completion of the evaluation and recommendation for award, the selected firm(s) will be required to execute a professional services agreement, a sample of which is included as **Attachment A**.

Notice of Termination: Upon failure of performance by the other party, or at the City’s convenience, either party may terminate the contract upon ten (10) days written notice to the other party. If the contract is to be terminated, the contractor shall be paid the amount due for work properly completed and approved by the City, up to the date of the notice of termination, based on the actual costs to the contractor attributable to the project, less any compensation to City for damages suffered as a result of Contractor’s failure to comply with the terms of the contract.

Conflict of Interest. The Contractor shall warrant that no official or employee of the City has an interest, has been employed or retained to solicit or aid in the procuring of the resulting contract, nor that any such person will be employed in the performance of such contract without immediate divulgence of such fact to the City.

Non-Collusion. Firms submitting proposals shall warrant that their offer is made without any previous understanding, agreement or connection with any person, firm or corporation submitting a separate proposal for the same project and is in all respects fair, without outside control, collusion, fraud or otherwise illegal action. This condition shall not apply to proposals

that are submitted by firms who have partnered with others to submit a cooperative proposal that clearly identifies a primary contractor and the associated sub-contractors.

Indemnification & Insurance Requirements. The City's standard indemnification and insurance requirements are provided in the sample contract, **Attachment A**. All costs of complying with the insurance requirements shall be included in your pricing. The selected firm shall provide complete and valid insurance certificates within ten (10) days of the City's written request. Failure to provide the documents within the time stated may result in the rejection of the firm's proposal.

Consultant represents that it has no known relationships with third parties, City Council members, or employees of City which would (1) present a conflict of interest with the rendering of services under this Agreement under Government Code Section 1090, the Political Reform Act (Government Code Section 81000 *et seq.*), or other applicable law, (2) prevent Consultant from performing the terms of this Agreement, or (3) present a significant opportunity for the disclosure of confidential information.

NOW, THEREFORE, for and in consideration of the mutual covenants and conditions herein contained, City and Consultant agree as follows:

3. DEFINITIONS

- 3.1. “Design Professional”: A Design Professional is any individual satisfying one or more of the following: (1) licensed as an architect pursuant to Business and Professions Code 5500 *et seq.*, (2) licensed as a landscape architect pursuant to Business and Professions Code 5615 *et seq.*, (3) licensed as a professional land surveyor pursuant to Business and Professions Code 8700 *et seq.*, or (4) registered as a professional engineer pursuant to Business and Professions Code 6700 *et seq.*
- 3.2. “Scope of Services”: Such professional services as are set forth in Consultant’s **[enter consultant’s proposal date]** proposal to City attached hereto as Exhibit A and incorporated herein by this reference.
- 3.3. “Agreement Administrator”: The Agreement Administrator for this project is **[Name and title]**. The Agreement Administrator shall be the principal point of contact at the City for this project. All services under this Agreement shall be performed at the request of the Agreement Administrator. The Agreement Administrator will establish the timetable for completion of

services and any interim milestones. City reserves the right to change this designation upon written notice to Consultant

- 3.4. “Approved Fee Schedule”: Consultant’s compensation rates are set forth in the fee schedule attached hereto as Exhibit B and incorporated herein by this reference. This fee schedule shall remain in effect for the duration of this Agreement unless modified in writing by mutual agreement of the parties.
- 3.5. “Maximum Amount”: The highest total compensation and costs payable to Consultant by City under this Agreement. The Maximum Amount under this Agreement is [REDACTED] Dollars (\$ [REDACTED]).
- 3.6. “Commencement Date”: [date].
- 3.7. “Termination Date”: [date]

4. CAMPAIGN CONTRIBUTIONS

This Agreement is subject to Government Code section 84308. Consultant shall disclose any contribution to an elected or appointed City official’s campaign or committee of more than five hundred dollars (\$500) made within 12 months preceding the Commencement Date or such other date required by that statute, by Consultant, its, her, or his agent, or another party affiliated with Consultant. Consultant shall provide a signed copy of the attached Campaign Contribution Disclosure Form to City before, or concurrently with, Consultant’s execution of this Agreement and no later than the Commencement Date.

5. TERM

The term of this Agreement shall commence at 12:00 a.m. on the Commencement Date and shall expire at 11:59 p.m. on the Termination Date unless extended by written agreement of the parties or terminated earlier under Section 17 (“Termination”) below. Consultant may request extensions of time to perform the services required hereunder. Such extensions shall be effective if authorized in advance by City in writing and incorporated in written amendments to this Agreement.

6. CONSULTANT’S DUTIES

- 6.1. **Services.** Consultant shall perform the services identified in the Scope of Services. City shall have the right to request, in writing, changes in the Scope of Services. Any such changes mutually agreed upon by the parties, and any corresponding increase or decrease in compensation, shall be incorporated by written amendment to this Agreement.
- 6.2. **Coordination with City.** In performing services under this Agreement, Consultant shall coordinate all contact with City through its Agreement Administrator.
- 6.3. **Budgetary Notification.** Consultant shall notify the Agreement Administrator, in writing, when fees and expenses incurred under this Agreement have reached eighty percent (80%) of the Maximum Amount. Consultant shall concurrently inform the Agreement Administrator, in writing, of Consultant’s estimate of total expenditures required to complete its current

assignments before proceeding, when the remaining work on such assignments would exceed the Maximum Amount.

- 6.4. **Business License.** Consultant shall obtain and maintain in force a City business license for the duration of this Agreement.
- 6.5. **Professional Standards.** Consultant shall perform all work to the highest standards of Consultant's profession and in a manner reasonably satisfactory to City. Consultant shall keep itself fully informed of and in compliance with all local, state, and federal laws, rules, and regulations in any manner affecting the performance of this Agreement, including all Cal/OSHA requirements, the conflict-of-interest provisions of Government Code § 1090 and the Political Reform Act (Government Code § 81000 et seq.).
- 6.6. **Avoid Conflicts.** During the term of this Agreement, Consultant shall not perform any work for another person or entity for whom Consultant was not working at the Commencement Date if such work would present a conflict interfering with performance under this Agreement. However, City may consent in writing to Consultant's performance of such work.
- 6.7. **Appropriate Personnel.** Consultant has, or will secure at its own expense, all personnel required to perform the services identified in the Scope of Services. All such services shall be performed by Consultant or under its supervision, and all personnel engaged in the work shall be qualified to perform such services. [Name of Project Manager] shall be Consultant's project administrator and shall have direct responsibility for management of Consultant's performance under this Agreement. No change shall be made in Consultant's project administrator without City's prior written consent.
- 6.8. **Substitution of Personnel.** Any persons named in the proposal or Scope of Services constitutes a promise to the City that those persons will perform and coordinate their respective services under this Agreement. Should one or more of such personnel become unavailable, Consultant may substitute other personnel of at least equal competence upon written approval of City. If City and Consultant cannot agree as to the substitution of key personnel, City may terminate this Agreement for cause.
- 6.9. **Permits and Approvals.** Consultant shall obtain, at its sole cost and expense, all permits and regulatory approvals necessary for Consultant's performance of this Agreement. This includes, but shall not be limited to, professional licenses, encroachment permits and building and safety permits and inspections.
- 6.10. **Notification of Organizational Changes.** Consultant shall notify the Agreement Administrator, in writing, of any change in name, ownership or control of Consultant's firm or of any subcontractor. Change of ownership or control of Consultant's firm may require an amendment to this Agreement.
- 6.11. **Records.** Consultant shall maintain all ledgers, books of account, invoices, vouchers, canceled checks, and other records or documents evidencing or relating to charges for services or expenditures and disbursements charged to City under this Agreement for a minimum of three (3) years, or for any longer period required by law, from the date of final payment to Consultant

under this Agreement. All such documents shall be made available for inspection, audit, and/or copying at any time during regular business hours, upon oral or written request of City. In addition, pursuant to Government Code Section 8546.7, if the amount of public funds expended under this Agreement exceeds ten thousand dollars, all such documents and this Agreement shall be subject to the examination and audit of the State Auditor, at the request of City or as part of any audit of City, for a period of three (3) years after final payment under this Agreement.

7. SUBCONTRACTING

- 7.1. **General Prohibition.** This Agreement covers professional services of a specific and unique nature. Except as otherwise provided herein, Consultant shall not assign or transfer its interest in this Agreement or subcontract any services to be performed without amending this Agreement.
- 7.2. **Consultant Responsible.** Consultant shall be responsible to City for all services to be performed under this Agreement.
- 7.3. **Identification in Fee Schedule.** All subcontractors shall be specifically listed and their billing rates identified in the Approved Fee Schedule, Exhibit B. Any changes must be approved by the Agreement Administrator in writing as an amendment to this Agreement.

8. COMPENSATION

- 8.1. **General.** City agrees to compensate Consultant for the services provided under this Agreement, and Consultant agrees to accept payment in accordance with the Fee Schedule in full satisfaction for such services. Compensation shall not exceed the Maximum Amount. Consultant shall not be reimbursed for any expenses unless provided for in this Agreement or authorized in writing by City in advance.
- 8.2. **Invoices.** Consultant shall submit to City an invoice, on a monthly basis or as otherwise agreed to by the Agreement Administrator, for services performed pursuant to this Agreement. Each invoice shall identify the Maximum Amount, the services rendered during the billing period, the amount due for the invoice, and the total amount previously invoiced. All labor charges shall be itemized by employee name and classification or position with the firm, the corresponding hourly rate, the hours worked, a description of each labor charge, and the total amount due for labor charges.
- 8.3. **Taxes.** City shall not withhold applicable taxes or other payroll deductions from payments made to Consultant except as otherwise required by law. Consultant shall be solely responsible for calculating, withholding, and paying all taxes.
- 8.4. **Disputes.** The parties agree to meet and confer at mutually agreeable times to resolve any disputed amounts contained in an invoice submitted by Consultant.
- 8.5. **Additional Work.** Consultant shall not be reimbursed for any expenses incurred for work performed outside the Scope of Services unless prior written approval is given by the City

through a fully executed written amendment. Consultant shall not undertake any such work without prior written approval of the City.

- 8.6. **City Satisfaction as Precondition to Payment.** Notwithstanding any other terms of this Agreement, no payments shall be made to Consultant until City is satisfied that the services are satisfactory.
- 8.7. **Right to Withhold Payments.** If Consultant fails to provide a deposit or promptly satisfy an indemnity obligation described in Section 12, City shall have the right to withhold payments under this Agreement to offset that amount.

9. PREVAILING WAGES

Consultant is aware of the requirements of California Labor Code Section 1720, et seq., and 1770, et seq., as well as California Code of Regulations, Title 8, Section 16000, et seq., (“Prevailing Wage Laws”), which require the payment of prevailing wage rates and the performance of other requirements on certain “public works” and “maintenance” projects including the design and preconstruction phases of a covered public works project. Consultant shall defend, indemnify, and hold the City, its elected officials, officers, employees, and agents free and harmless from any claim or liability arising out of any failure or alleged failure of Consultant to comply with the Prevailing Wage Laws.

10. OWNERSHIP OF WRITTEN PRODUCTS

All reports, documents or other written material, and all electronic files, including computer-aided design files, developed by Consultant in the performance of this Agreement (such written material and electronic files are collectively known as “written products”) shall be and remain the property of City without restriction or limitation upon its use or dissemination by City except as provided by law. Consultant may take and retain copies of such written products as desired, but no such written products shall be the subject of a copyright application by Consultant.

11. RELATIONSHIP OF PARTIES

- 11.1. **General.** Consultant is, and shall be a wholly independent contractor as to the City under this Agreement.
- 11.2. **No Agent Authority.** Consultant shall have no power to incur any debt, obligation, or liability on behalf of City or otherwise to act on behalf of City as an agent. Neither City nor any of its agents shall have control over the conduct of Consultant or any of Consultant’s employees, except as set forth in this Agreement. Consultant shall not represent that it is, or that any of its agents or employees are, in any manner employees of City.
- 11.3. **Independent Contractor Status.** Under no circumstances shall Consultant or its employees look to the City as an employer. Consultant shall not be entitled to any benefits. City makes no representation as to the effect of this independent contractor relationship on Consultant’s previously earned California Public Employees Retirement System (“CalPERS”) retirement benefits, if any, and Consultant specifically assumes the responsibility for making such a determination. Consultant shall be responsible for all reports and obligations including, but not

limited to: social security taxes, income tax withholding, unemployment insurance, disability insurance, and workers' compensation, and other applicable federal and state taxes.

- 11.4. **Indemnification of CalPERS Determination.** In the event that Consultant or any employee, agent, or subcontractor of Consultant providing services under this Agreement claims or is determined by a court of competent jurisdiction or CalPERS to be eligible for enrollment in CalPERS as an employee of the City, Consultant shall indemnify, defend, and hold harmless City for the payment of any employee and/or employer contributions for CalPERS benefits on behalf of Consultant or its employees, agents, or subcontractors, as well as for the payment of any penalties and interest on such contributions, which would otherwise be the responsibility of City.

12. INDEMNIFICATION

- 12.1. **Definitions.** For purposes of this Section, "Consultant" shall include Consultant, its officers, employees, servants, agents, or subcontractors, or anyone directly or indirectly employed by either Consultant or its subcontractors, in the performance of this Agreement. "City" shall include City, its officials, officers, agents, employees and volunteers.
- 12.2. **Consultant to Indemnify City.** Where the services to be provided by Consultant under this Agreement are design professional services, as that term is defined under Civil Code Section 2782.8, Consultant agrees to indemnify, defend and hold harmless, the City, its officers, officials, employees and volunteers from any and all claims, demands, costs or liability that actually or allegedly arise out of, or pertain to, or relate to the negligence, recklessness or willful misconduct of Consultant and its agents in the performance of services under this contract, but this indemnity does not apply to liability for damages for bodily injury, property damage or other loss, arising from the sole negligence, active negligence or willful misconduct by the City, its officers, official employees, and volunteers. If it is finally adjudicated that liability is caused by the comparative active negligence or willful misconduct of the City, then Consultant's indemnification and defense obligations shall be reduced in proportion to the established comparative liability of the City and shall not exceed the Consultant's proportionate percentage of fault.

As respects all acts or omissions which do not arise directly out of the performance of design professional services, including but not limited to those acts or omissions normally covered by general and automobile liability insurance, and to the full extent permitted by law, Consultant agrees to indemnify, defend and hold harmless the City, its officers, officials, agents, employees, and volunteers from and against any claims, demands, losses, liability of any kind or nature (including liability for claims, suits, actions, arbitration proceedings, administrative proceedings, regulatory proceedings, losses, expenses or costs of any kind, whether actual, alleged or threatened, including attorney's fees and costs, court costs, interest, defense costs, and expert witness fees) where the same arise out of, are in connection with, are a consequence of, or are in any way attributable to, in whole or in part, the performance of this Agreement by Consultant or by any individual or entity for which Consultant is legally liable, including but not limited to officers, agents, employees or sub-contractors of Consultant, excepting those which arise out of the active negligence, sole negligence or willful misconduct of the City, its officers, officials, employees and volunteers.

- 12.3. **Scope of Indemnity.** Personal injury shall include injury or damage due to death or injury to any person, whether physical, emotional, consequential or otherwise, Property damage shall include injury to any personal or real property. Consultant shall not be required to indemnify City for such loss or damage as is caused by the sole active negligence or willful misconduct of the City. If it is finally adjudicated that liability is caused by the comparative negligence or willful misconduct of an indemnified party, then Consultant's indemnification obligation shall be reduced in proportion to the established comparative liability.
- 12.4. **Attorneys Fees.** Such costs and expenses shall include reasonable attorneys' fees for counsel of City's choice, expert fees and all other costs and fees of litigation. Consultant shall not be entitled to any refund of attorneys' fees, defense costs or expenses in the event that it is adjudicated to have been non-negligent.
- 12.5. **Defense Deposit.** The City may request a deposit for defense costs from Consultant with respect to a claim. If the City requests a defense deposit, Consultant shall provide it within 15 days of the request.
- 12.6. **Waiver of Statutory Immunity.** The obligations of Consultant under this Section are not limited by the provisions of any workers' compensation act or similar act. Consultant expressly waives its statutory immunity under such statutes or laws as to City.
- 12.7. **Indemnification by Subcontractors.** Consultant agrees to obtain executed indemnity agreements with provisions identical to those set forth here in this Section from each and every subcontractor or any other person or entity involved in the performance of this Agreement on Consultant's behalf.
- 12.8. **Insurance Not a Substitute.** City does not waive any indemnity rights by accepting any insurance policy or certificate required pursuant to this Agreement. Consultant's indemnification obligations apply regardless of whether or not any insurance policies are determined to be applicable to the claim, demand, damage, liability, loss, cost or expense.
- 12.9. **Civil Code.** The parties are aware of the provisions of Civil Code 2782.8 relating to the indemnification and the duty and the cost to defend a public agency by a Design Professional and agree that this Section complies therewith.

13. INSURANCE

- 13.1. **Insurance Required.** Consultant shall maintain insurance as described in this Section and shall require all of its subcontractors, consultants, and other agents to do the same. Approval of the insurance by the City shall not relieve or decrease any liability of Consultant Any requirement for insurance to be maintained after completion of the work shall survive this Agreement.
- 13.2. **Documentation of Insurance.** City will not execute this agreement until it has received a complete set of all required documentation of insurance coverage. However, failure to obtain the required documents prior to the work beginning shall not waive the Consultant's obligation to provide them. Consultant shall file with City:

- Certificate of Insurance, indicating companies acceptable to City, with a Best's Rating of no less than A:VII showing. The Certificate of Insurance must include the following reference: [insert project name]
- Documentation of Best's rating acceptable to the City.
- Original endorsements effecting coverage for all policies required by this Agreement.
- Complete, certified copies of all required insurance policies, including endorsements affecting the coverage.

13.3. Coverage Amounts. Insurance coverage shall be at least in the following minimum amounts:

- Professional Liability Insurance: \$1,000,000 per occurrence,
\$2,000,000 aggregate
- General Liability:
 - General Aggregate: \$2,000,000
 - Products Comp/Op Aggregate \$2,000,000
 - Personal & Advertising Injury \$1,000,000
 - Each Occurrence \$1,000,000
 - Fire Damage (any one fire) \$ 50,000
 - Medical Expense (any 1 person) \$ 5,000
- Workers' Compensation:
 - Workers' Compensation Statutory Limits
 - EL Each Accident \$1,000,000
 - EL Disease - Policy Limit \$1,000,000
 - EL Disease - Each Employee \$1,000,000
- Automobile Liability
 - Any vehicle, combined single limit \$1,000,000

Any available insurance proceeds broader than or in excess of the specified minimum insurance coverage requirements or limits shall be available to the City as additional insured. Furthermore, the requirements for coverage and limits shall be the greater of (1) the minimum coverage and limits specified in this Agreement, or (2) the broader coverage and maximum limits of coverage of any insurance policy or proceeds available to the named insured

13.4. General Liability Insurance. Commercial General Liability Insurance shall be no less broad than ISO form CG 00 01. Coverage must be on a standard Occurrence form. Claims-Made, modified, limited or restricted Occurrence forms are not acceptable.

13.5. Worker's Compensation Insurance. Consultant is aware of the provisions of Section 3700 of the Labor Code which requires every employer to carry Workers' Compensation (or to undertake equivalent self-insurance), and Consultant will comply with such provisions before commencing the performance of the work of this Agreement. If such insurance is underwritten by any agency other than the State Compensation Fund, such agency shall be a company authorized to do business in the State of California.

- 13.6. **Automobile Liability Insurance.** Covered vehicles shall include owned if any, non-owned, and hired automobiles and, trucks.
- 13.7. **Professional Liability Insurance or Errors & Omissions Coverage.** The deductible or self-insured retention may not exceed \$50,000. If the insurance is on a Claims-Made basis, the retroactive date shall be no later than the commencement of the work. Coverage shall be continued for two years after the completion of the work by one of the following: (1) renewal of the existing policy; (2) an extended reporting period endorsement; or (3) replacement insurance with a retroactive date no later than the commencement of the work under this Agreement.
- 13.8. **Claims-Made Policies.** If any of the required policies provide coverage on a claims-made basis the Retroactive Date must be shown and must be before the date of the contract or the beginning of contract work. Claims-Made Insurance must be maintained and evidence of insurance must be provided for at least five (5) years after completion of the contract of work. If coverage is canceled or non-renewed, and not replaced with another claims-made policy form with a Retroactive Date prior to the contract effective date, the Consultant must purchase “extended reporting” coverage for a minimum of five (5) years after completion of contract work.
- 13.9. **Additional Insured Endorsements.** The City, its City Council, Commissions, officers, and employees of the City of Grass Valley must be endorsed as an additional insured for each policy required herein, other than Professional Errors and Omissions, for liability arising out of ongoing and completed operations by or on behalf of the Consultant. Consultant’s insurance policies shall be primary as respects any claims related to or as the result of the Consultant’s work. Any insurance, pooled coverage or self-insurance maintained by the City, its elected or appointed officials, directors, officers, agents, employees, volunteers, or consultants shall be non-contributory. All endorsements shall be signed by a person authorized by the insurer to bind coverage on its behalf. General liability coverage can be provided using an endorsement to the Consultant’s insurance at least as broad as ISO Form CG 20 10 11 85 or both CG 20 10 and CG 20 37.
- 13.10. **Failure to Maintain Coverage.** In the event any policy is canceled prior to the completion of the project and the Consultant does not furnish a new certificate of insurance prior to cancellation, City has the right, but not the duty, to obtain the required insurance and deduct the premium(s) from any amounts due the Consultant under this Agreement. Failure of the Consultant to maintain the insurance required by this Agreement, or to comply with any of the requirements of this Section, shall constitute a material breach of this Agreement.
- 13.11. **Notices.** Consultant shall provide immediate written notice if (1) any of the required insurance policies is terminated; (2) the limits of any of the required policies are reduced; (3) or the deductible or self-insured retention is increased. Consultant shall provide no less than 30 days’ notice of any cancellation or material change to policies required by this Agreement. Consultant shall provide proof that cancelled or expired policies of insurance have been renewed or replaced with other policies providing at least the same coverage. Such proof will be furnished at least two weeks prior to the expiration of the coverages. The name

and address for Additional Insured Endorsements, Certificates of Insurance and Notices of Cancellation is: City of Grass Valley, Attn: [insert department or individual], 125 E. Main Street, Grass Valley, CA 95945.

- 13.12. **Consultant's Insurance Primary.** The insurance provided by Consultant, including all endorsements, shall be primary to any coverage available to City. Any insurance or self-insurance maintained by City and/or its officers, employees, agents or volunteers, shall be in excess of Consultant's insurance and shall not contribute with it.
- 13.13. **Waiver of Subrogation.** Consultant hereby waives all rights of subrogation against the City. Consultant shall additionally waive such rights either by endorsement to each policy or provide proof of such waiver in the policy itself.
- 13.14. **Report of Claims to City.** Consultant shall report to the City, in addition to the Consultant's insurer, any and all insurance claims submitted to Consultant's insurer in connection with the services under this Agreement.
- 13.15. **Premium Payments and Deductibles.** Consultant must disclose all deductibles and self-insured retention amounts to the City. The City may require the Consultant to provide proof of ability to pay losses and related investigations, claim administration, and defense expenses within retention amounts. Ultimately, City must approve all such amounts prior to execution of this Agreement.
- City has no obligation to pay any premiums, assessments, or deductibles under any policy required in this Agreement. Consultant shall be responsible for all premiums and deductibles in all of Consultant's insurance policies. The amount of deductibles for insurance coverage required herein are subject to City's approval.
- 13.16. **Duty to Defend and Indemnify.** Consultant's duties to defend and indemnify City under this Agreement shall not be limited by the foregoing insurance requirements and shall survive the expiration of this Agreement.

14. MUTUAL COOPERATION

- 14.1. **City Cooperation in Performance.** City shall provide Consultant with all pertinent data, documents and other requested information as is reasonably available for the proper performance of Consultant's services under this Agreement.
- 14.2. **Consultant Cooperation in Defense of Claims.** If any claim or action is brought against City relating to Consultant's performance in connection with this Agreement, Consultant shall render any reasonable assistance that City may require in the defense of that claim or action.

15. NOTICES

Any notices, bills, invoices, or reports required by this Agreement shall be deemed received on: (i) the day of delivery if delivered by hand, facsimile or overnight courier service during Consultant's and City's regular business hours; or (ii) on the third business day following deposit in the United States mail if

delivered by mail, postage prepaid, to the addresses listed below (or to such other addresses as the parties may, from time to time, designate in writing).

16. SURVIVING COVENANTS

The parties agree that the covenants contained in paragraph 6.11 (Records), paragraph 11.4 (Indemnification of CalPERS Determination), Section 12 (Indemnity), paragraph 13.8 (Claims-Made Policies), paragraph 14.2 (Consultant Cooperation in Defense of Claims), and paragraph 19.1 (Confidentiality) of this Agreement shall survive the expiration or termination of this Agreement, subject to the provisions and limitations of this Agreement and all otherwise applicable statutes of limitations and repose.

17. TERMINATION

- 17.1. **City Termination.** City may terminate this Agreement for any reason on five calendar days' written notice to Consultant. Consultant agrees to cease all work under this Agreement on or before the effective date of any notice of termination. All City data, documents, objects, materials or other tangible things shall be returned to City upon the termination or expiration of this Agreement.
- 17.2. **Consultant Termination.** Consultant may terminate this Agreement for a material breach of this Agreement upon 30 days' notice.
- 17.3. **Compensation Following Termination.** Upon termination, Consultant shall be paid based on the work satisfactorily performed at the time of termination. In no event shall Consultant be entitled to receive more than the amount that would be paid to Consultant for the full performance of the services required by this Agreement. The City shall have the benefit of such work as may have been completed up to the time of such termination.

- 17.4. **Remedies.** City retains any and all available legal and equitable remedies for Consultant's breach of this Agreement.

18. INTERPRETATION OF AGREEMENT

- 18.1. **Governing Law.** This Agreement shall be governed and construed in accordance with the laws of the State of California.
- 18.2. **Integration of Exhibits.** All documents referenced as exhibits in this Agreement are hereby incorporated into this Agreement. In the event of any material discrepancy between the express provisions of this Agreement and the provisions of any document incorporated herein by reference, the provisions of this Agreement shall prevail. This instrument contains the entire Agreement between City and Consultant with respect to the transactions contemplated herein. No other prior oral or written agreements are binding upon the parties. Amendments hereto or deviations herefrom shall be effective and binding only if made in writing and executed on by City and Consultant.
- 18.3. **Headings.** The headings and captions appearing at the commencement of the sections hereof, and in any paragraph thereof, are descriptive only and for convenience in reference to this Agreement. Should there be any conflict between such heading, and the section or paragraph thereof at the head of which it appears, the language of the section or paragraph shall control and govern in the construction of this Agreement.
- 18.4. **Pronouns.** Masculine or feminine pronouns shall be substituted for the neuter form and vice versa, and the plural shall be substituted for the singular form and vice versa, in any place or places herein in which the context requires such substitution(s).
- 18.5. **Severability.** If any term or provision of this Agreement or the application thereof to any person or circumstance shall, to any extent, be invalid or unenforceable, then such term or provision shall be amended to, and solely to the extent necessary to, cure such invalidity or unenforceability, and shall be enforceable in its amended form. In such event, the remainder of this Agreement, or the application of such term or provision to persons or circumstances other than those as to which it is held invalid or unenforceable, shall not be affected, and each term and provision of this Agreement shall be valid and be enforced to the fullest extent permitted by law.
- 18.6. **No Presumption Against Drafter.** Each party had an opportunity to consult with an attorney in reviewing and drafting this agreement. Any uncertainty or ambiguity shall not be construed for or against any party based on attribution of drafting to any party.

19. GENERAL PROVISIONS

- 19.1. **Confidentiality.** All data, documents, discussion, or other information developed or received by Consultant for performance of this Agreement are deemed confidential and Consultant shall not disclose it without prior written consent by City. City shall grant such consent if disclosure

is legally required. All City data shall be returned to City upon the termination or expiration of this Agreement.

- 19.2. **Conflicts of Interest.** Consultant maintains and warrants that it has not employed nor retained any company or person, other than a bona fide employee working solely for Consultant, to solicit or secure this Agreement. Further, Consultant warrants that it has not paid nor has it agreed to pay any company or person, other than a bona fide employee working solely for Consultant, any fee, commission, percentage, brokerage fee, gift or other consideration contingent upon or resulting from the award or making of this Agreement. Consultant further agrees to file, or shall cause its employees or subcontractor to file, a Statement of Economic Interest with the City's Filing Officer if required under state law in the performance of the services. For breach or violation of this warranty, City shall have the right to rescind this Agreement without liability. For the term of this Agreement, no member, officer, or employee of City, during the term of his or her service with City, shall have any direct interest in this Agreement, or obtain any present or anticipated material benefit arising therefrom.
- 19.3. **Non-assignment.** Consultant shall not delegate, transfer, subcontract or assign its duties or rights hereunder, either in whole or in part, without City's prior written consent, and any attempt to do so shall be void and of no effect. City shall not be obligated or liable under this Agreement to any party other than Consultant.
- 19.4. **Binding on Successors.** This Agreement shall be binding on the successors and assigns of the parties.
- 19.5. **No Third-Party Beneficiaries.** Except as expressly stated herein, there is no intended third-party beneficiary of any right or obligation assumed by the parties.
- 19.6. **Time of the Essence.** Time is of the essence for each and every provision of this Agreement.
- 19.7. **Non-Discrimination.** Consultant shall not discriminate against any employee or applicant for employment because of race, sex (including pregnancy, childbirth, or related medical condition), creed, national origin, color, disability as defined by law, disabled veteran status, Vietnam veteran status, religion, age (40 and above), medical condition (cancer-related), marital status, ancestry, or sexual orientation. Employment actions to which this provision applies shall include, but not be limited to, the following: employment, upgrading, demotion, or transfer; recruitment or recruitment advertising; layoff or termination; rates of pay or other forms of compensation; or in terms, conditions or privileges of employment, and selection for training. Consultant agrees to post in conspicuous places, available to employees and applicants for employment, the provisions of this nondiscrimination clause.
- 19.8. **Waiver.** No provision, covenant, or condition of this Agreement shall be deemed to have been waived by City or Consultant unless in writing signed by one authorized to bind the party asserted to have consented to the waiver. The waiver by City or Consultant of any breach of any provision, covenant, or condition of this Agreement shall not be deemed to be a waiver of any subsequent breach of the same or any other provision, covenant, or condition.

- 19.9. **Excused Failure to Perform.** Consultant shall not be liable for any failure to perform if Consultant presents acceptable evidence, in City's sole judgment, that such failure was due to causes beyond the control and without the fault or negligence of Consultant.
- 19.10. **Remedies Non-Exclusive.** Each right, power and remedy provided for herein or now or hereafter existing at law, in equity, by statute, or otherwise shall be cumulative and shall be in addition to every other right, power, or remedy provided for herein or now or hereafter existing at law, in equity, by statute, or otherwise. The exercise, the commencement of the exercise, or the forbearance from the exercise by any party of any one or more of such rights, powers or remedies shall not preclude the simultaneous or later exercise by such party of any or all of such other rights, powers or remedies.
- 19.11. **Attorneys' Fees.** If legal action shall be necessary to enforce any term, covenant or condition contained in this Agreement, each party shall pay its own costs, including any accountants' and attorneys' fees expended in the action.
- 19.12. **Venue.** The venue for any litigation shall be Nevada County, California and Consultant hereby consents to jurisdiction in Nevada County for purposes of resolving any dispute or enforcing any obligation arising under this Agreement.

CAMPAIGN CONTRIBUTION DISCLOSURE PROVISIONS

Cities are subject to the campaign disclosure provisions detailed in Government Code Section 84308.

Please carefully read the following information to determine if the provisions apply to you. If you determine that the provisions are applicable, the Campaign Disclosure Form must be completed and returned to the City with your application.

1. No City councilmember or commissioner shall accept, solicit, or direct a contribution of more than \$500 from any party,¹ financially interested participant,² or agent³ while a proceeding is pending or for 12 months after the City makes a final decision. This prohibition commences when your application has been filed, or the proceeding is otherwise initiated.
2. A party to a City proceeding shall disclose on the record of the proceeding any contribution of more than \$500 made to any councilmember or commissioner by the party, or agent, during the preceding 12 months. No party to or participant in a City proceeding shall make a contribution of more than \$500 to a councilmember or commissioner during the proceeding and for 12 months after the City makes a final decision. No agent to a party or participant shall make a contribution in any amount to a councilmember or commissioner during the proceeding and for 12 months after the City makes a final decision.
3. Before the City makes a decision as to a City proceeding, any councilmember or commissioner who received contributions of more than \$500 in the preceding 12 months from any party to a proceeding, or agent, shall disclose that fact on the record of the proceeding, and shall be disqualified from participating in the proceeding. However, if any councilmember or commissioner receives a contribution that otherwise would require disqualification, and returns the contribution within 30 days of: (a) making the decision, or (b) knowing about the contribution and the relevant proceeding, whichever comes last, that councilmember or commissioner may participate in the proceeding.

¹ "Party" is defined as any person who files an application for, or is the subject of, a proceeding.² "Participant" is defined as any person who actively supports or opposes a particular decision in a proceeding including by submitting written or oral comment at a commission or council meeting.

³ "Agent" is defined as a person who represents a party in connection with a proceeding for compensation who appears before or otherwise communicates with the City for the purpose of influencing the proceeding. If an individual acting as an agent also is acting as an employee or member of a law, architectural, engineering, or consulting firm, or a similar entity or corporation, both the individual and the entity or corporation are agents. When a closely held corporation is a party to a proceeding, the majority shareholder is subject to these provisions.

To determine whether you or your agent made a campaign contribution of more than \$500 to a councilmember or commissioner in the past 12 months, all contributions by you or your agent in that period must be aggregated.
